Optimism is the faith that leads to achievement

2015 marked Horizon's 40th anniversary of providing community behavioral health services for individuals recovering from mental health and substance use disorders. For these 40 years we have remained constant in our commitment to be progressive and independent, and to seek out the best clinical and operational practices, emerging technologies, and new strategies to help our patients and their families. We have often chosen to lead in advocating and fighting for those who are not able to fight for themselves. We have remained committed to our staff — knowing that a team of contented, highly trained and dedicated caregivers is required to provide the highest quality, most effective and empathic treatment and recovery services.

We opened in 1975 with the primary goal to assist individuals with serious mental illness who were transitioning to living in the community after many years of being institutionalized. We had few clinical strategies, resources and medications to serve this population, and we had limited knowledge about "recovery" from mental illness. Today, much of that has changed. People with mental health and substance use disorders (SUD) have multiple effective treatments available to them, they are more involved as partners in their treatment planning, and perhaps most important, the medical community has come to understand that recovery from mental illness and substance use disorders is critical for their patients' long-term health.

While much has changed for the better, we currently face even more daunting challenges. Every day we see increasingly sick patients who are unstable and in crisis, while the available resources to serve them are insufficient. Seriously mentally ill and addicted patients are increasingly incarcerated for minor crimes rather than treated due to the lack of short and long-term inpatient beds and suitable

supportive housing. The opiate epidemic — with exponentially increasing overdoses and overdose deaths — continues to exceed our substance use disorder treatment resources.

This is occurring in the midst of the reform of the entire healthcare delivery system

including changing service requirements and payment methodologies, and the creation of comprehensive systems of health care.

Our dedicated and innovative Horizon team, without exception, delivers more than 100% every day. They truly change and save lives. I am so grateful for their dedication to our patients, to our mission, and to our culture of caring.

I am confident we will successfully meet our challenges by staying true to our now 40-year history of continually improving and expanding our operations and services to achieve our goals. Thank you to all of our supporters, friends and our board members who assist us in so many ways to live our mission: Recovery. Changing lives. Saving lives.

Fine-tuning the ways we serve our patients

From sensitive, targeted programming to expanded facilities, Horizon continues to develop new and innovative paths to recovery.

Focusing on young adults

Ground was broken in October for Delta Village, a 25-bed intensive drug treatment center that will provide increased access for the growing number of young people struggling with addiction. Located on the Horizon Village Campus in Sanborn, the residence will specifically address the unique needs of this age group. The \$4.5 million project, funded by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS), is expected to open in summer 2016.

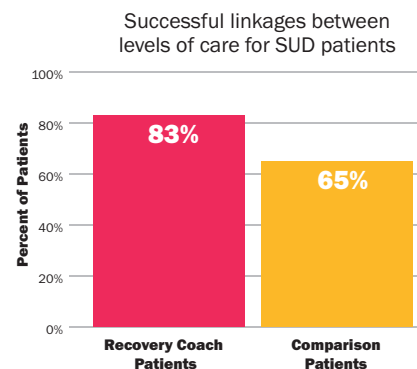
Capturing data to gain insight

Horizon's information-gathering capabilities have expanded beyond financial and operational results. Our Business Intelligence team now monitors clinical data as well. Evaluating outcomes enables us to determine the efficacy of various types of interventions. These insights guide decisions about programs likely to be effective for helping patients achieve their goals.



Recovery coaching for better outcomes

Patients are most vulnerable to dropping out when transitioning between levels of treatment, and following up after detox can be particularly challenging. The goal of our recovery coaches (RCs) is to keep high-risk individuals in treatment. RCs make sure patients are connected to the next level of care, as well as to health care benefits and other services. They offer expertise, create a clear plan of action and serve as accountability partners. RCs support both inpatient and outpatient patients and, like business or life coaches, make a significant impact on their progress.



Patients with recovery coaches more likely to stay in treatment

In a pilot program, Horizon found that patients who worked with recovery coaches were more likely to progress successfully from one level of care to the next and remain engaged in treatment than patients who did not.

State legislators express support for Horizon

Last year, Horizon was host for two major press conferences announcing legislative initiatives that would positively affect our organization, our patients and our community.

State Democratic leader tours Terrace House

In a visit to Terrace House in September, State Senator and Democratic Conference Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins called for more state funding to combat the epidemic of heroin and opioid abuse. The major legislative package — presented with Senators Tim Kennedy and Marc Panepinto — would stiffen penalties for selling heroin and opioids



Seeking a ban on powdered alcohol In April, Anne Constantino, Horizon president and CEO, spoke about the dangers of powdered alcohol at a news conference featuring Senator Tim Kennedy and Assemblywoman Crystal Peoples-Stokes. Their bill proposes to ban sales of the substance — nicknamed palcohol — and make it illegal for anyone under age 21 to possess it.

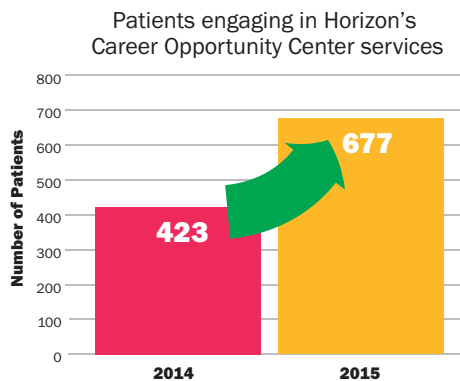

Gaining independence through career support

Beyond clinical care, Horizon takes extra steps to help patients re-enter society, find and maintain employment and become productive members of the community. Our Career Opportunity Center services include comprehensive testing to determine vocational interests and abilities, hands-on assessment, job preparation, skills training, job placement and post-employment support. As a certified provider for New York's Adult Career and Continuing Education Services - Vocational Rehabilitation (ACCESS-VR), Horizon places patients in meaningful and permanent competitive employment settings that pay a living wage.



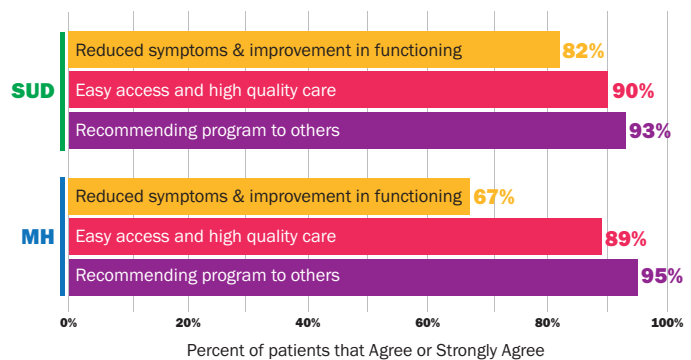
Career Opportunity Center achieves 60% growth

Last year, 677 individuals sought employment assistance, including both Horizon patients and referrals from other providers of substance use disorder and mental health services.

Winning patient endorsements

Like all behavioral health organizations, Horizon is required by New York State to survey patients about their perception of care when they complete treatment. We work hard to achieve good results, and are especially gratified that our efforts are appreciated and effective. We consider willingness to refer others the highest praise we can receive, and virtually all Horizon patients report they would recommend our services.

Patient perception of care: Key indicators for outpatient SUD and MH programs

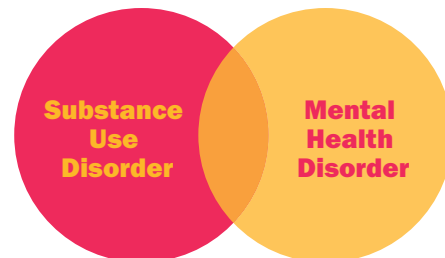


High satisfaction rates among outpatient patients

An overwhelming majority of patients treated for substance use disorder (SUD) or mental health (MH) report reduced symptoms and improved functioning. Horizon also scores exceptionally high on easy access, high quality of care and recommendations to others.

Training clinicians for integrated care

While Horizon has always stressed the importance of personalized treatment, patients diagnosed with both mental health and substance use disorders have had separate counselors and separate plans. In 2015, we introduced extensive training for clinicians in integrated care. This new model enables each patient to work with a single counselor, improving convenience and increasing the likelihood of success. Today, 17 clinicians are providing fully integrated care for more than 450 patients.

\$150,000 for long-term recovery services During a press conference at Terrace House, Assemblywoman Crystal Peoples-Stokes announced a \$150,000 New York State grant to help Horizon extend recovery support over longer periods of time. Horizon's comprehensive care includes up to nine months of counseling for men and women upon completion of treatment for alcohol, opiate or other substance use disorders.



2nd annual Wellness Walk Energetic walkers enjoyed blue skies and balmy breezes for this hugely successful fund-raiser in September. We welcomed more than 400 walkers, and raised over \$25,000 – both figures more than doubling our results from 2014.
